Course purpose and objectives	<p>The course deals with the issue of personal data protection, its purposes, and its theoretical foundations. The purpose of the course is to present and understand the basic principles governing the law of personal data protection, focusing on the General Data Protection Regulation (Regulation (EU) 2016/679) of the European Parliament and of the Council of 27 April 2016, as it stands today. Additionally, the aim is to examine how the above regulation is implemented in Greek and Cypriot legal orders. Finally, the goal is to present contemporary issues in the field of personal data and to critically analyse the relevant case law, especially that of the European Court of Justice.</p>			
Learning outcomes	<p>Upon completion of the course, students are expected to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Understand the theoretical foundations and purposes of personal data protection. • Know and understand the basic principles and objectives of the General Data Protection Regulation (Regulation (EU) 2016/679). • Recognize the rights arising from Regulation (EU) 2016/679 and be able to analyse them. • Identify the subject of personal data and distinguish between the data controller and the processor. • Apply the principles derived from Regulation (EU) 2016/679, particularly the principle of proportionality. • Identify the existence of new rights and obligations arising from Regulation (EU) 2016/679, such as the right to be forgotten. • Apply the provisions of Regulation (EU) 2016/679 to real-life scenarios.
