Course purpose and objectives	<p>The purpose of the course is for students to deepen their knowledge with respect to the matters of immunity of States and State officials, as well as State responsibility for internationally wrongful acts, while they will be taught in greater detail the international methods of dispute resolution. Moreover, the students will delve into the institutional structure of the European Union, as well as the legal protection provided by the law of the European Union, the rules on common market and the fundamental freedoms of the European Union. Finally, emphasis will be placed on a better understanding of the relationship between domestic law and international law on the one hand, and domestic law and European Union law on the other.</p>
